This pin is distinctive, represents one program, and displays symbols of the elements important to the school. The outer ring features a laurel wreath; this wreath symbolizes health and protection.

The white inner ring provides identification of our nursing school, Elizabeth T. MacNeil, and the bottom portion of the white ring distinguishes an achievement of baccalaureate of science in Nursing Degree (BSN).

Within the center of the pin is Dominican University's crest. Within the crest it has the three roses, the university's motto "Caritas Veritas", and the coat of arms. The Sisters paired "Caritas" -meaning love- with "Veritas" - meaning truth- as both applies to the mission and character to our university.

As you embark on this journey, you become part of a cherished legacy of nursing alumni who have profoundly impacted the world through their dedicated practice. We entrust you with the important task of upholding the excellence exemplified by those who came before you, ensuring that the legacy of compassionate care and exceptional nursing continues to thrive.
