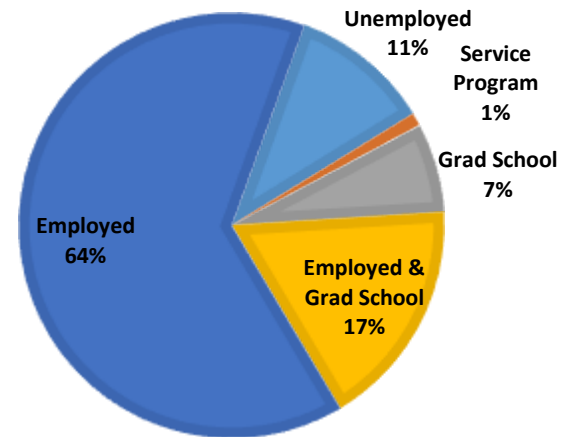
### Alumnae/i Success and Outcomes

Dominican University not only provides students with a solid foundation to any further educational pursuits they may choose to follow, it also helps students develop skills that will prepare them for a global job market. Dominican graduates are desirable candidates as they search for employment or post-graduate education.

#### Outcomes include:

- 89% Success Rate**  
 Within a year of graduation, 89% of students are employed, participating in a post-graduation service program (such as AmeriCorps or Dominican Volunteers), and/or attending graduate or professional school.
- 24% Continued Study in a Graduate Program**  
 A total of 24% of bachelor's degree recipients pursue graduate or professional degrees immediately following their undergraduate programs. Some of the institutions they attend include John Marshall Law School, Loyola University Chicago, University of Illinois at Chicago, and Dominican University.
- Employment and Average Income**  
 More than 58% of students are employed full-time within a year of graduation. The average entry-level income for these students is \$36,410.

#### Other Highlights of the Undergraduate Follow-Up Study of the Class of 2016:

- A total of 89% of graduates state that they would recommend Dominican University to others.
- 91% of graduates indicate that Dominican has an atmosphere that is intellectually stimulating; with the vast majority stating that they felt prepared to pursue their post-graduate career and education goals.
